Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Pastor Mark Mayfield writes a wonderful weekly article that he shares. From time to time, with his permission, I like to share it in our newsletter as a "guest columnist". Please enjoy the following:

Will It Work

Last summer Margie and I purchased a little tree with bright green foliage and nice flowers. That little tree entertained us all summer by constantly producing new flowers. There is a problem with this plant, however. It is not cold hardy enough to survive our winters here. In order to keep the plant alive, we moved it into my dad's cellar before the ground froze and have just recently brought it back out into the sunlight. The appearance of this plant right now is sort of pathetic, it holds none of the beauty it held last summer. Our hope is that the sunlight and warm weather will bring it back to its former glory and the special care we took with it over the winter will work.

A plant which is not cold hardy in our area is not the only thing which gets stored for long periods of time at our house. I have been blessed by being able to acquire several hand tools over the years, some manual, some corded, and some battery powered. Whenever I go to retrieve my hand saw, it is with the hope that the saw has not rusted and become difficult to use. When I go after my power saw, it is (continued from page 1)

my hope that the mice have not chewed through the electric cord. When I decide to use my battery powered tools, it is with the hope that the batteries don't need charged.

Long term storage is not limited to hand tools either. The lawn mower and weed trimmer sit idle all winter. All of the lighted Christmas decorations lay in storage 11 months out of the year. Whatever the item, it is always our hope that we can retrieve it, remove the dust from it, and it will work.

As I read the Old Testament of our Holy Scriptures, it is amazing to me how often the Israelites treated God just like power tools or lawn mowers which only need to be used part of the time. Whenever things were going well for God's chosen people, they seemed to move away from God and put Him into storage, as if He really wasn't needed at that time. Then in times of distress and despair, the Israelites went to the storage closet, dusted off their belief in God and His power, and hoped that God would still work for them.

It is my long-standing belief that people have not really changed since Adam and Eve walked on this earth. Regardless of how advanced and improved we think we have become over the years since God created us, our actions indicate that is just not the case. Whenever things are going really well for us, we tend to put God on a shelf and go our merry way, thinking that we will be able to do just fine on our own. Then when we start seeing trouble, we run to the shelf and dust off God in the hope that He will still work for us.

Folks, our relationship with God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit should not follow this pattern. It is important for us to keep Them with us through the good times and the bad. It is also important to acknowledge Their presence with us all of the time, not just when we are troubled or distressed. The wonderful thing about all of this is that God, Jesus, and the Holy Spirit will never get rusty, have Their power cord chewed through, and Their batteries will never run down. A strong and constant relationship with God will always work.

Jesus knows about broken hearts. Jesus is here and speaks to every victim, to every broken heart, to those who are fearful, and to those who just don't know what to do.

Folks, in the midst of our shock, fear, anger, and lost-ness, we see and hear Jesus in people like you and me; and we know that God is here! God has searched us out. God is trying to find us, recover us, heal us, reconcile us, no matter what crisis or disaster strikes us.

God is breaking through this tragedy as God's Son, our Savior, makes himself known through us. People of faith, God is here and God is searching us out so that our Savior may be seen and heard and made known through us. The God who shows love and destroys hate, the God who searches without end, the God who overcomes death with life, the God whose Son is working to bring peace through us, this God, my friends is the God who is with us! We are not alone! The families who lost loved ones are not alone!

There is no better time for us to allow the Pentecost Spirit to fill each of us once again! There is no better time to allow the Christ, the Prince of Peace, to be born



AN UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

You may have noticed new intercom systems on both the Educational Wing doors. We have installed an Access Control system that keeps folks in the church safer. On normal weekdays, during office hours, you can press the intercom by the door to talk to Debbie or Clare. They can then let you in by releasing the door. If you have a key, you can still gain access using it at the Parking Lot door. Please re-lock the door when you enter. The Washington St. door will no longer be accessible with your key. You can, however, enter with your key using the stairwell door. Please re-lock the door when you enter.

The Washington St. Sanctuary door and the alleyway Chapel door will not be affected by this. They are not open during normal office hours. On Sundays, all doors will be open and accessible.

The Trustees have also upgraded the security system.


