"Let us hold fast to the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who has promised is faithful."

-Hebrews 10:23

The writer of Hebrews (who is anonymous, but sometimes attributed to Paul), is addressing a group of readers who share a Christian commitment. They are experiencing persecution and may have become disappointed that God's promised kingdom had not yet come. Some may have even abandoned hope and the community. The author implores them to keep the faith and hope, and remember the commitment of those who shared a covenant with God in the past.

We too have days when we feel disappointed with God and his promises as we interpret them. We consider abandoning hope and our community of faith. It's dark and rainy in our souls. But take heart, we are neither betrayed or abandoned. God is faithful. Spring is here. We are blessed. May we blossom and grow in hope and faith!

A Brief History of Mother's Day

Mother's Day is set apart every year in honor of motherhood. On the second Sunday in May, many families and churches make a special point of honoring mothers.

A day for honoring mothers was observed many years ago in England. It was called Mothering Sunday, and came in mid-Lent. Yugoslavs and people in other nations have observed similar days.

Anna M. Jarvis (1864-1948), founder of Mother's Day, was born in Grafton, West Virginia. She began a campaign for a nationwide observance of Mother's Day. She chose the second Sunday in May, and began the custom of wearing a carnation. On May 10, 1908, churches in Grafton and Philadelphia held Mother's Day celebrations. The service at Andrews Methodist Episcopal Church in Grafton honored the memory of Anna Jarvis' own mother, Mrs. Anna Reeves Jarvis.

At the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church in Minneapolis, Minn., in 1912, a delegate from Andrews Church introduced a resolution recognizing Anna Jarvis as the founder of Mother's Day. It suggested that the second Sunday in May be observed as Mother's Day.

Mother's Day received national recognition on May 9, 1914. On that day, President Woodrow Wilson signed a joint resolution of Congress recommending that Congress and the executive departments of the federal government observe Mother's Day. The next year, President Wilson was authorized to proclaim Mother's Day an annual national observance.


AN UPDATE FROM THE TRUSTEES

June 28th would have been John Wesley's 313th birthday. The Anglican minister and theologian is credited with the foundation of Methodism, and was much loved and respected both in his time and today.

Wesley placed huge value on social justice, and under his direction Methodists went on to lead movements on numerous social issues including education, prison reform and the abolition of slavery.

He was actually born on 17 June 1703, but the adoption of the Gregorian calendar in 1752 meant that 11 days were added and Wesley began celebrating his birthday on June 28. According to Kenneth Collins' John Wesley: A Theological Journey, he did so "usually with boastful comments about his excellent health". He eventually died aged 87 in March 1791.
